Duke of Edinburgh volunteering





Top Year 11 Physics students



At the beginning of February, 26 Year 11 students took part in an online competition run by the British Physics Olympiad organisation (BPhO).

Over two lunchtimes, they faced a fiendish selection of questions under tight time pressure. 4,494 students from 156 schools took part, with most students receiving a Bronze or Commendation certificate.

All of the SGS team achieved higher than this, with 10 Silvers and 16 Golds. The "real" BPhO Year 11 competition takes place in a couple of weeks and is an hour-long exam designed to stretch the best in the country, so these results bode very well for that.

At half term, a group of students went on a trip to visit the land of elves and Vikings... Iceland!

Our first couple of days included some stormy weather, ultimately meaning some of the activities scheduled could not go ahead. Our teachers, however, were not troubled by this course of events and decided instead to make the group play Taskmaster, with different rooms competing for points. Luckily, on the second day we were able to visit two gorgeous waterfalls, the second one having a viewpoint at the top from which we could look down on the cascading water.

On the third day, we went on a road trip, visiting a flood plain blanketed in lava (which itself was covered with snow), an iceberg lagoon with gigantic lumps of ice from the nearby glacier floating about and a trek by a glacial lake after which many people's shoes were soaked.

Then we embarked upon our forth day in Iceland. This day contained, the glacier walk, which for some would be the highlight of the trip! After a trek through the snow with crampons attached, we came to the glacier. This massive block of ice, slowly moving downwards, had crevasses and cave systems littered over it. Those who had the chance slid through an ice tunnel in the glacier and had a little venture into an ice cave. Afterwards, we walked around the rim of a dormant volcano.

Our last full day in Iceland saw us completing the Golden Circle Tour, with the Blue Lagoon replaced with the Secret Lagoon due to age restrictions. The Secret Lagoon is a swimming pool-sized geothermally heated lagoon with hot springs and a tiny geyser trickling into it. Next was the Gullfoss waterfall. This was massive and had a huge amount of water running down it. Then came Strokkur at Geysir, the geyser spouting out an awesome column of steam. Lastly, Þingvellir, the crack in the earth. This is a shallow ravine splitting the Eurasian and North American tectonic plates. It also happens to be the site where the first parliament in the world was founded.

Before heading to the airport, we had a short while to browse around Reykjavik before returning home. All in all, this trip was amazing and I would recommend it to everyone who would be eligible for the trip next time!
