We sat and watched our winning video, which had enabled us to get to the final at all, before psyching out our competition and realising that many of their teachers had earned the prefix of 'Dr'. Mr Pletts had also come with us to the competition.

# **Year 11 House Physics**

The British Physics Olympiad competition for Year 11s provides an opportunity for students to be pushed way outside their comfort zones. Designed to stretch the very top students, it is an hour-long exam comprising many different styles of question, often featuring topics that the students are unfamiliar with but can, with some deep thought, wrap their heads around. It is difficult and time-pressured. Suffice to say, all students received the lowest score they'd ever had in a physics exam!

Despite that, the 37 students achieved a very impressive haul of 8 Golds, 11 Silvers and 11 Bronzes. However, whilst the group covered themselves in glory, not all Houses managed it as can be seen by the results. The maximum mark each House could have achieved was 400:

Adding the results to the leader board, we find that Lenham have compensated for the Year 7's spectacular last place and put themselves joint top:


1st	Warwick	15

But sign up today, the deadline is Friday 29 April.


# Art update
