# Sixth Form Careers and Enrichment at SGS



As a school and Sixth Form, we are always looking to develop the careers provision and enrichment opportunities at Sutton Grammar School, supported by our wonderful and extensive parent and alumni body. Below are some of the ways in which we are looking to develop our current provision, and we would appreciate it if anyone could support or be involved in one or a combination of these areas.

#### Work experience – 27 June - 1 July

We are in the final stages of organising work experience for Years 10 and 12. This is a fantastic opportunity for students to take part in the world of work and is the first change for many students to practically engage in areas of industry that they are passionate about. As part of this, Year 12 work experience is being run for the first time, which is a huge undertaking that requires a large amount of planning. At present, there are a number of students who are struggling to find placements due to Covid-related factors, and students have often not heard back from the companies they have reached out to. If anyone has the ability to take on a student (or students) during this week or knows of anyone who might be able to take on a student for a week, we would be hugely appreciative. Equally, please let us know if this is something that you would be willing to set up for the following year.

#### Lecture series - September onwards

A series of fortnightly lectures is available all students in Year 12. These lectures are presented by parents, alumni and contacts of the school from a range of industries who give up their time to come and speak to our students about their field of work or education to inspire students and give them direction on how their futures could be shaped. Due to the success of this programme, we are looking to extend it to Year 13 to run alongside the Year 12 series, although this requires us to extend our network of generous individuals who would be willing to give up their time. #### Higher Education afternoon - 6 July

As a further facet of our careers offering to students in Year 12, we are arranging a Higher Education afternoon for students on Wednesday, 6 July, from 2.30 to 3.30pm. This afternoon will involve individuals talking to students in groups of around 20 for two or three 10-15 minute slots. In the past, we have had individuals and ex-students coming in to represent fields from medicine to the army, to universities and beyond. ## **DofE Bronze Practice trip**

On Friday, 6 May, 24 Year 9 students (some of whom are pictured below) left on their Bronze Practice expedition to the New Forest. They arrived at Harry's Island Scout Camp just after 7pm, and after a briefing from the Outspark instructors, Joel and Julia, they set up their tents and made ready for the expedition.

Saturday morning was bright and sunny, and the four expedition teams quickly packed away their tents, cooked breakfast and set off on the routes they had planned across the forest. Over the next two days, the boys walked over 35km through a mixture of dense forest and open heathland and were incredibly lucky with the weather. All groups did exceptionally well, and the Outspark instructors commented on how well they'd done.

The groups will undertake their qualifying expedition in Dorset in two weeks' time.

Last term, we made board games exploring different historical topics that we had studied in class. The Year 9s focused on the French Revolution, whilst the Year 8s focused on the reign of Henry VIII and the Reformation. Representing the multi-faceted and complex nature of historical events as simple, enjoyable board games was a challenge; however, all of us were able to create fun and engaging games that portrayed historical events. # Macbeth performance

Last Friday, the Young Shakespeare Company performed one of Shakespeare's most prominent tragedies, "Macbeth", for Year 9. Interestingly, the play was adapted to account for the small size of the acting troupe and the limited time they had to perform it to us. Whilst Macbeth is the shortest of Shakespeare's tragedies, many scenes had to be cut or shortened both to ensure that the play remained in the allotted time and that it could be performed by only four actors. Even though it was undeniably sad to miss scenes such as the famous Porter Scene (thought by some to be the origin of knock, knock jokes) and the murder of Macduff's family, the performance was undeniably well executed, both logistically and dramatically. The actors were able to create an intense atmosphere in spite of not having control of the lighting or set. For example, throughout the play, sound effects were frequently employed to heighten the mood of scenes, which, in combination with the good acting, more than compensated for the lack of control over the set design and lighting.

At the start of the play, rather than beginning the performance straight away, the acting troupe discussed how they would perform the play with the audience, talking about how the actors interpreted the different characters' actions and the decisions made during the performance. For example, particular emphasis was placed on how the Witches would be presented. They asked members of the audience for particular styles in which the Witches could be portrayed. Not only is such a method good for rehearsing, but it also helped us to understand how the presentation of characters in Macbeth (particularly the Witches) could impact the interpretation of the play.

Ultimately, the portrayal of the Witches in this production of Macbeth was both conceptually interesting and very visually striking. Whilst still emphasising their supernatural nature, rather than being weird fiends serving Hecate, they were spirits possessing the dead bodies of beheaded traitors. Not only was this visually effective, emphasising the unnatural nature of the Witches, it also invites comparison with Macbeth, who is decapitated as a traitor at the end of the play. This depiction of the Sisters could be intended to emphasise their influence over Macbeth's actions or is aimed at inviting comparisons between the traitors (and perhaps the Thane of Cawdor himself) with Macbeth. Regardless, the changes to the Witches' character were both striking and conceptually interesting.

In conclusion, the performance was extremely well executed, adapting to the limitations of a small acting troupe and the minimalistic set. Not only were they able to create a coherent and enjoyable performance, but they also created an interesting one. No one can deny that they learnt something from the performance. From the discussions on how to perform the play at the beginning to the depictions of different characters, most prominently the Witches, this production of Macbeth proved to be both entertaining and educational.
