# Christmas Jumper Day



Friday, 9 December will be Christmas Jumper Mufti Day. All students can wear their own clothes to school and Christmas jumpers are very much encouraged.

This year our Christmas Jumper Day will be supporting two local charities, Sutton Night Watch and Sutton foodbank.

Sutton Night Watch is a local charity that supports homeless people within the borough and surrounding areas. Three times a week, a group of volunteers run a soup kitchen and food bank at the back of Sutton Station. They also give out items such as clothes, blankets, sleeping bags, food and toiletries to those in need. Your support is greatly appreciated.

Sutton foodbank provides three days of nutritionally balanced emergency food and support to local people who are referred to them in crisis. They are part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK. Over 90 per cent of the food distributed by foodbanks in The Trussell Trust network is donated by the public, which is why food donations are absolutely vital to help provide food to local people in need.

Students wishing to wear their own clothes will need to pay £2, via ParentPay, with all the proceeds going to Sutton Night Watch. Please also bring in a food donation for the Sutton foodbank. The list below are the items the foodbank needs the most.

#### The year ahead by Head of House, Mr Green



Our Art & Photography Department is the first one in the country (and probably the world) to have integrated stereoscopy into the curriculum. KS3 students started using analyph glasses (pictured above right) to better understand perspective and 3D space, and KS4/5 students have been making their own stereo images using our unique 3D stereoscopic camera (pictured above left). The director of London Stereoscopy Company, Denis Pellerin, who visited SGS last year, said: 'Introducing stereoscopy to school children is the best way to make sure the medium will perdure' and that having stereoscopy as part of the curriculum is 'a great achievement.'

# Year 10 bloggers needed






