Eligibility for free school meals

Have your circumstances changed? Your child may be able to get free school meals if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16.190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you receive).

By registering for free school meals you could save hundreds of pounds per year. In turn, the school will receive funding, known as Pupil Premium, for use within the general curriculum, as the government pays schools for each pupil registered.

For those students entitled to a free school meal, a daily sum is automatically added to the child's cashless card and they pass through the checkout in the same way as those paying for their meals.

If you meet the criteria and would like to apply for free school meals, please email Ms O'Connor in the school office. She will arrange a convenient time to call you and input all the relevant details into a secure government website to apply or you can request a paper copy of the form to fill in.

Intermediate Maths Challenge



Well done to the 150 students from Years 9, 10 and 11 who sat the UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge on Wednesday, 1 February (pictured below). The multiple choice challenge was 60 minutes long and encouraged mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. Results will be back in about three weeks.

We are excited to announce that author Dominic Sandbrook is coming in to talk to students on Friday, 3 March when we will be celebrating World Book Day.


Sandbrook's 'Adventures in Time' book series, which are written with young adults in mind, will be available to purchase on the day in the school library for £10 cash, while stocks last.



Year 8 House Mathematics $X = \frac{-6 \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$ Competition

At the end of the Autumn Term, a House Mathematics Competition was held for Year 8. The challenge consisted of two sections: with one section centred on Algebra and Number, and the second section centred on Geometry. Houses competed in teams with a maximum of five members, with some team changes between the two sections which were held on consecutive days. The primary aim of the questions selected was to get participants to use their problem-solving skills, whilst also using the fundamental mathematical concepts known to SGS students. Nevertheless, the familiarity was minimised, with often unfamiliar question types (collected from across the world, with countries from Brazil to Singapore) providing additional challenge.







It was personally heartening to see my fellow students (pictured above) and staff enjoying and engaging with this competition and I would like to thank members of Year 8 for their support. The competition has been a success and I can confirm that the Maths Faculty will be holding similar competitions for other KS3 year groups soon.

Before announcing the results of the quiz, I would like to thank the following for participating: Charlie (8M), Avaneesh (8M), Joel (8M), Nathan (8M), Zion (8M), Elvin (8M), Bowen (8L), Kavish (8L), Aaron (8L), Ben (8L), Sam (8L), Leo (8L), Harry (8G), Mubashir (8G), Leon (8G), Hayden (8G), Minyik (8G), Alex (8G), Tanay (8W), Adrian (8W), Aad (8W), Yaseen (8W), Finlay (8W), Tashif (8W), Max (8T), Sourjayan (8T) and Ezra (8T); note that some houses may have more than five members because they had differing teams on both days. I can confirm that overall Greyhound took the first place followed by Manor, Throwley, Warwick and Lenham, and the results were tight.

Finally I would like to thank Aarush K for helping me host the quiz, and I would like to thank Miss Kendall and Ms Singleton along with the rest of the Maths Faculty for giving me the opportunity to run this competition.

Good mental health and wellbeing is essential for school students. It helps them to learn effectively, cope with day-to-day challenges and develop into resilient young adults.




Saturday Workshops
