


### New Library book club

### **Artist visit**



GCSE and A Level Art students recently received a talk from Denis Pellerin, a photo-historian with a passion for stereo photography, and Rebecca Sharpe, who works for the London Stereoscopic Company.

Students learnt about the evolution of stereoscopy and how it has developed over the years; they received a hands-on workshop looking at different stereo equipment and were able to make their own stereo images.


Mr Pellerin gifted everyone beautiful OWL stereoscopic viewers and anaglyth lenses to be able to view the photos in 3D, as well as his book, co-authored with Dr Brian May- Queen's guitarist – for which we are all extremely grateful.

Our guests are both experts in this field of photography and have equipped our students with the knowledge and skills necessary to make and view stereo photos.





### **House Physics competition**



After a little disruption due to the announcement of extra assessments for the Year 11s and 13s, House Physics is now underway. Each year group has its own competition and the scores go towards an overall House Physics score, with points going towards the House Shield at the end of the year.

Year 9s have spent a couple of lunchtimes going through some fiendish problems, otherwise known as Fermi Quiz. Named after Italian/American physicist Enrico Fermi, these problems are solved by correctly estimating the order of magnitude of the answer to a tricky question. For example, "If every person in the UK held hands, how long would the line be?" or "How many balloons can you fit in an Olympic size swimming pool?"

With questions ranging from the subatomic to the interstellar in size, the students' ability to estimate and calculate (without getting worried about not knowing everything) was put to the test and Year 9 proved to be exceptional. The lowest score would, in many previous years, have won and the winning score of 36 is the highest seen.

After only one round, the House Physics leader board is a direct reflection of the positions in the Year 9 round. Points are allocated with 5 for 1st place, 4 for 2nd etc. In the case of a tie, points for both places are added and shared equally.

Warwick – 5 points Lenham – 4 points Manor – 2.5 points Throwley – 2.5 points Greyhound – 1 point

There are 6 more rounds so plenty of time for this to change before the summer.

## January mass testing for students

We have been asked by the government to carry out lateral flow testing before students return to school in January.

Full details of the testing schedule have now been sent to parents. Testing is voluntary and we will not stop any student returning to school if they have not given consent to be tested, but we are strongly encouraging all students to take the onsite test.

We would like to thank all parents for their continued support and understanding as we test and stagger the return of students.

### Testing reminder

Government advice is that school staff and students continue testing twice weekly. All students have been given test kits to take home and should log their results on TestRegister.co.uk.

Students should continue to test over the Christmas break, and just before they return to school in January. Positive tests should be reported immediately and a PCR test taken as soon as possible. We recommend testing on a Sunday and Wednesday and the results should be logged on testregister.co.uk

## Senior Maths Challenge Success 2021

In November, 102 students, mainly from Y12 and Y13, took part in this year's UKMT Senior Maths Challenge. The top 10% in the UK receive a gold certificate, the next 20% silver and the next 30% bronze. Congratulations to all students from SGS. They achieved 60 golds, 25 silvers and 16 bronzes.




United Kingdom Mathematics Trust
